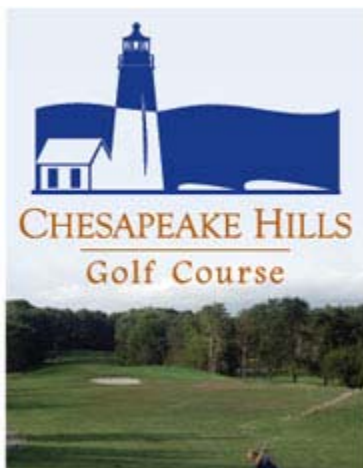

County to Host Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day

Event Offers Free Disposal for County Residents

Household hazardous waste collection day will give Calvert County residents the opportunity to safely dispose of hazardous substances free of charge. During this event, a licensed contractor will collect household hazardous waste for proper disposal.

The service, which is typical of programs implemented by other Maryland counties, ensures that Calvert County meets all state and federal requirements with regard to the safe collection of household hazardous waste.

Hazardous waste commonly found in the home includes materials such as oil-based paints, pool chemicals, solvents, fertilizers and other items usually labeled with the words "DANGER," "POISON" or "WARNING." These items should be separated from regular household trash and disposed of in an environmentally friendly way.

longer accept household hazardous waste. Household hazardous waste will be collected four times per year during designated collection days. Other collection days in 2010 will be held June 26 at Appeal Landfill, September 25 at Mt. Hope Community Center and November 20 at Appeal Landfill. County residents may still drop off trash, recyclables and certain other materials at customer convenience centers and the Appeal Landfill, including motor oil and oil filters, antifreeze, batteries and various types of light bulbs.

Hazardous waste collection is limited to Calvert County residents only and proof of residency is required. Commercial businesses are prohibited. For information call 410-326-0210 or visit the county's [household hazardous waste Web page](#) for a full listing of materials accepted.

This year the U.S. Census Bureau will take a count of every resident of the United States for Census 2010 and census forms are going out this month. Do your part -- your participation matters!

Census information is used to allocate billions of dollars in government funding, but that is not all. Businesses use this data to make decisions on relocation or expansion and lawmakers use it to determine voter districts.



Completing the census form is easy. The 2010 Census questionnaire has only 10 questions and takes approximately 10 minutes to finish. Your answers are confidential and protected by law.
